

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' DAY FILM SCREENING: YINTAH "Land"

Monday, Oct. 14, 2024

YINTAH is a feature-length documentary on the Wet'suwet'en nation's fight for sovereignty. Spanning more than a decade, the film follows Howilhkat Freda Huson and Sleydo' Molly Wickham as their nation reoccupies and protects their ancestral lands from several of the largest fossil fuel companies on earth.

Meaning "land" in the Wet'suwet'en language, YINTAH, tells the story of an Indigenous nation asserting sovereignty. It is the story of the Wet'suwet'en people reoccupying their territory

and resisting the construction of multiple pipelines. The film follows Tsakë ze' Howilhkat Freda Huson and Tsakë ze' Sleydo' Molly Wickham, along with the Wet'suwet'en Hereditary Chiefs and fellow land defenders, as they reoccupy and protect their traditional land in a decade-long battle to keep out the companies that seek to exploit it.
