Biden-Harris administration releases 10-year National Plan on Native Language Revitalization

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

WASHINGTON — At the 2024 White House Tribal Nations Summit on Dec. 9, Departments of the Interior, Education and Health and Human Services released 10-year National Plan Native Language Revitalization, which out-

government-wide strategy to support the revitalization, protection, preservation and reclamation of Native languages.

The plan, a joint effort of the agencies, charts a path to help address the United States government's role in the loss of Native languages across the continental U.S., Alaska and Hawai'i.

The National Plan on Native Revitalization Language a comprehensive, is part of the Biden-Harris

administration's work to confront the systematic and deliberate campaign by the U.S. to forcibly assimilate Indigenous peoples and eradicate Native languages and cultures - a campaign extensively documented by Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland's Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative, and formally acknowledged by President Biden in his October 2024 apology to Native communities.

"Indigenous languages are central to our cultures, our life ways, and who we are as people. They connect us to our ancestors, to our homelands, and to our place in the world," said Secretary Haaland. "This ambitious plan represents the Biden-Harris administration's commitment to address the wrongs of the past and restore what has been taken from us."

"Ialways say: Multilingualism is a superpower - and that includes Native American languages," said Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona. "During my time as secretary of education, I've been fortunate to travel through Indian Country and learn beautiful words in Oneida, Dakota, and Nakota languages. One thing was crystal clear: When young people reclaim their Native languages, they reconnect deeply with who

Giin ina owe gimazina'igan? Tribal Libraries awarded two-year project grant

The Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Libraries are proud to announce that they have been awarded an Enhancement Grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services for an upcoming two-year project titled "Giin ina owe gimazina'igan? (Is this your book?)"

This project builds upon the success of the 2023 project, "Kina gda gindaasomi, kina gda zhibiigemi (We All Read, We All Write)," which saw members of the SCIT community successfully publish their own books.

Previously published titles included in the 2023 project are "These Are Not the Stories" by Charmaine



Marjorie Benz-Ba, "Tribal Observing: Seasons in Time" by Joseph Sowmick, "Resurgence of the Mind's Eye" by Elisa Grossman, and the "Kina gda gindaasomi, kina gda zhibiigemi (We All Read, We All Write) Anthology," which features contributions from various community members.

This project "Giin ina owe gimazina'igan?" aims to improve educational programs by fostering a strong writing community, offering workshops, self-publishing tools, mentorship opportunities, and much more. This initiative is significant as it works to meet the growing demand for books that celebrate and promote Anishinaabe culture, history, and language.

A big difference of this year's project is the shift in focus.

"During the first project, we received multiple request from the community for children's books and language books," said Tribal Librarian Anne Heidemann. "This project will target K-12 and post-secondary groups specifically, while still welcoming participation from the outside community."

Heidemann anticipates publishing an even greater number of titles compared to the previous project, which will further expand opportunities for local writers and storytellers.

A key component of "Giin ina owe gimazina'igan?" is the involvement of published Indigenous writers, who will serve as mentors to participants by offering guidance and support for both large-scale personal projects, as well as smaller contributions.

Participants interested in shorter works will have the opportunity to feature their writing in the second installment of the "Kina Gda Gindaasomi, Kina Gda Zhibiigemi Anthology."

This project represents an exciting opportunity to preserve and share stories, strengthen cultural literacy, and empower aspiring authors within the Saginaw Chippewa Tribal community.

they are and where they come from. But Native peoples have suffered from shameful policies that aimed to eradicate these languages and cultures for too long.

"I am hopeful that this national plan is a start to the federal government's remediation of its participation in those policies. And I am hopeful we can all choose to keep fighting for a future where Native communities have the tools and support to keep their languages alive and their cultures thriving."

The plan addresses a chronic under-investment in Native language revitalization to date.

The Bureau of Indian Education funds 187 schools for American Indian and Alaska Native students and is tasked with providing Indigenous students with a culturally-relevant high-quality education – yet

it received no dedicated funding for language revitalization until 2017

and annual appropriations have not exceeded \$7.5 million for any one budget year in the years since.

The plan released last month calls for a \$16.7 billion investment for Native language revitalization programs for federally recognized tribes and the Native Hawaiian Community.

"We use language to write history, share knowledge, map the future, and pass down traditions," said Secretary of Health and Human Services Xavier Becerra. "Investing in language revitalization strengthens communities and contributes to their resiliency. HHS is a proud and critical contributor to this coordinated effort and the benefits it will deliver."

Developed in consultation with Tribal Nations, non-profit organizations, subject-matter experts, and key stakeholders, the plan calls for:

Expanding access to immersion language environments by:

- Supporting 100 language nests, educational programs, that provide childcare and instruction in a Native language for children under the age of seven.
- Funding 100 new K-12 Native language immersion schools, educational institutions where at least 50 percent of instruction is conducted in a Native language.
- Supporting 37 centers dedicated to language preservation, instruction and cultural studies to revitalize and support language and culture, including those at Tribal Colleges and Universities.
- Providing scholarships for families to support language and culture.

Bolstering community-led revitalization efforts by:

- Supporting 100 mentor-apprentice programs—initiatives pairing fluent speakers with adult learners for intensive language transmission.
- Restructuring the way federal funds are allocated to support tribal sovereignty and

self-determination through a flexible funding model that flows money directly to tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations.

Tribal Community

• Funding community-based summer, supplemental and after-school programs to increase Native language learning opportunities outside of traditional classrooms.

Developing, growing and sustaining Native language support networks by:

- Recruiting and training 10,000 Native language teachers to meet the need for educators.
- Establishing a \$100 million innovation fund to encourage tribes, individuals and the private sector to develop new solutions for language revitalization through curriculum and technology.
- Supporting technical assistance providers to create schools and programs, including those with expertise in urban Indian settings and with the Native Hawaiian community.

Additionally, last month, the Interior Department announced a cooperative agreement with the National Fund for Excellence in American Indian Education. This partnership will provide \$7.5 million in existing grant funding to BIE schools supporting the launch or expansion of immersion programs and create a network of educators and school leaders committed to Native language revitalization.

This funding will help build a network of BIE schools committed to integrating Native language immersion and cultural education into their curricula, offering students the tools to connect with their language and heritage. Together with the National Plan for Native Language Revitalization, these efforts create a comprehensive strategy to protect, preserve and reclaim Indigenous languages across the United States.

The White House Tribal Nations Summit provides an opportunity for the Biden-Harris administration and tribal leaders from the 574 federally recognized tribes to discuss ways the federal government can invest in and strengthen nation-to-nation relationships as well as ensure that progress in Indian Country endures for years to come.

A year in review: SCIT Housing Department update

With the New Year and the winter season comes the opportunity to reflect on the previous year and a time for taking stock. The Saginaw Chippewa Housing Department certainly had a very productive year in 2024.

The Housing Department is fully grant funded under the Native American Housing and Self Determination Act, of 1996, NAHASDA.

Every year the U.S. Congress authorizes an appropriation of funds for Native American housing activities, and those funds are dispersed to the Native American tribes through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. In 2024, the amount allocated to SCIT was \$2,534,404.

One major accomplishment in 2024 was the construction of the Supportive Housing building with 16 rental apartments, located at 6870 E. Broadway. With the support and encouragement of the construction manager, Accounting Department, Legal Services, Information Technology Department, and the Tribal Council, Housing was able to finish the project on time and no Tribal funds were needed in spite of the post-pandemic inflation economy.

During the past two years, Housing was able to assist 92 low-income SCIT households under the Homeowners Assistance Funds (HAF) Program. That program began in January 2023 and was funded under the American Rescue Plan Act.

The main goal was to prevent homeowner mortgage foreclosures for those who were financially affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Home repairs necessary to keep homeowners in their homes was also an eligible use of the funding. Housing was able to utilize all of the funding of \$1,202,924.

Other community projects included utilizing NAHASDA grant funds in the amount of \$35,000 to upgrade the existing outdoor basketball court located behind Nimkee Fitness with safety fencing, outdoor lighting, and bench seating.

Housing also tried some new rental assistance programs: The College Rental Assistance Program and the Rental Attainment Program. Both programs were funded under the annual NAHASDA grant.

The Rental Attainment Program was designed to pay the security deposit and first month's rent for eligible applicants. There were seven SCIT members benefitting from that program.

The College Rental Assistance Program was intended to assist enrolled Native American college students to pay a portion of their monthly rent during the school year. There was a total of three SCIT college students assisted under that program.

None of this work could be accomplished without a hard-working and reliable staff. In 2024, the Housing Department employed 10 full time, one part time and two temporary employees; nine of which are SCIT members.

I am very grateful for the people that work with me at the Housing Department to bring service and assistance to our community. It makes one feel good to be part of such an enthusiastic and solid team.

The Housing Department is looking forward to being helpful and serving the community in the New Year. In the months ahead readers can look for information in the Tribal Observer for Housing related programs, and under the Services/Housing Dept. tab of the SCIT website.

Accomplishments

- 10,509 visitors came to experience all the Center has to offer. An additional 2,776 people received educational services at 24 different offsite bookings by our staff. Onsite and offsite combined totals 13,285 visitors for FY2024.
- Ziibiwing hosted 117 tours totaling 3,505 people, 161 events with 4,456 people in attendance for combined special events, and cultural programs for the Tribal community and the general public.
- The ZCS maintains 7 Tribal Cemeteries, including Baseline Cemetery (Isabella & Union Townships, Isabella County), Flint Stone Street Cemetery (Flint Township, Genesee County), Mission Creek Cemetery (Union Township, Isabella County), Nibokaan Cemetery (Chippewa Township, Isabella County), Nippinsing Cemetery (Isabella Township, Isabella County), Nottawa Cemetery (Nottawa Township, Isabella County), Swartz Creek Cemetery (Gaines Township, Genesee County), in addition to the Ziibiwing Center's 3-acre lawn (14.41 acres per week).
- Repatriated and reburied one individual, two associated funerary objects from Kerr#3 in Bay County MI; one individual, two associated funerary objects from Warner School, Genesee County MI; one individual from Leeson, Oakland County MI; and three individuals, twenty-two associated funerary objects from Bugai, Saginaw County, MI from the State Historic Preservation Office and University of Michigan Museum of Anthropological Archaeology. The ancestors and their belongings were reburied in the Nibokaan Cemetery on November 3, 2023 by the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan in partnership with the Michigan Anishinaabek Cultural Preservation and Repatriation Alliance (MACPRA).
- Ziibiwing conducted NAGPRA consultations with the Castle Museum of Saginaw County History Inc., Kent State University, Mercyhurst University, Michigan History Center, Michigan State Historic Preservation Office, Michigan State Police- Lansing Post, Michigan State University, MSU Forensic Anthropology Laboratory, Northern Illinois University, Ohio History Connection, Shiawassee National Wildlife Refuge, Suny Broome Community College, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Tennessee-Kentucky, University of Toledo, and Vassar College.
- Grant funding provided salary and fringe for Digitization Specialist, Mindy Bailey for part-time employment at the Ziibiwing Center.

- Ziibiwing secured a 50% 3rd Party In-Kind Match in the amount of \$50,000 by Michigan State University towards the Anishinabek Porcupine Quill Art Exhibit.
- The Tribal Historic Preservation Office (THPO) completed 205 cultural resource reviews. These reviews are required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and protect the cultural resources/traditional cultural properties of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan. In addition, the THPO participated in 24 activities/events, 3 were out of state, 6 were hosted events at the Ziibiwing Center, 4 presentations about the Mount Pleasant Indian Industrial Boarding School (MIIBS), 3 at the MIIBS location, one repatriation, multiple conferences and updates to the ZC Board of Directors.
- Awarded 4 of 5 grants submitted in FY24:
 - 1) National Endowment for the Humanities-Chair's Grant
 - 2) Natural Resource Conservation Service/Partnership
 - 3) Tribal Historic Preservation Office
 - 4) The National Endowment for the Humanities in partnership with the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition for a total of \$193,026.00. Other available Grant funding in FY24 available to spend from previously funded grants was \$346,393.00, for a combined total of \$539,419.00.
- There were approximately 19,058 individual contacts made by our team, including physical visits, phone calls, and emails. Ziibiwing also maintains a social media presence on Facebook.
- The Research Center served 3,498 in-person visits for research related activity and/or guidance.
- Anita Heard (Research Center Coordinator) serves on the Saginaw Chippewa Data Governance Board and is a member of the Society of American Archivists.
- William Johnson (Curator and Operations Manager) serves on the Michigan Anishinaabek Cultural Preservation & Repatriation Alliance (MACPRA), serving his fourth consecutive 4-year term as Chairman and the University of Michigan's Advisory Committee on Culturally Unidentifiable Human Remains under NAGPRA (since 2011).
- Nathaniel Lambertson (former Funding & Development Specialist) served on the Anishinabe Language Revitalization Committee.
- Noelle Wells (Administrative Assistant II) served on the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan's Powwow Committee.
- ZC Gift Shop sales totaled \$232,449.00 for FY2024. The Gift Shop has been slowly liquidating old merchandise and increasing merchandise selections from Indigenous vendors and Indigenous artists.



Celebrating Resilience: Tribal College hosts events throughout Native American Heritage Month

Throughout Native American Heritage Month in November, the Saginaw Chippewa Tribal College hosted several events "Celebrating Resilience."

One exciting event welcomed Tia Wood, a soulful Native singer, to SCTC on Nov. 13 during a noon Lunch & Learn event.

Becoming a social media influencer during the pandemic, Tia Wood has already gained major success in a short amount of time. She became the first Indigenous woman signed to Sony Music.

Wood caught Sony's attention on social media after sharing cultural singing while showcasing her soulful vocals.

"People from all different backgrounds and all over the world were into it," she said about becoming a content creator.

Wood moved from the dirt roads of Saddle Lake Cree Nation in central Alberta, Canada to Los Angeles.

Wood spoke about being the daughter of two residential school survivors, and said she is "thankful for her parents' resilience."

Derived from a musical family, Wood is no stranger to the love of music.

"All of my family have been the ones behind the microphone, other than me," she said, discussing life before her musical career.

Her father, Earl Wood, is a member of the powwow drum group, Northern Cree (JUNO award-winning and Grammynominated). Her mother, Cynthia Jim, is in an all-women drum group. Her sister, Fawn Wood, is a JUNO Award-winning singer.

She spoke about her sister, Fawn, being the first female to win the hand drum contest at the Gathering of Nations Powwow.

"The crowd roared," Tia Wood said of her sister at the

Prior to her LA move, Wood said she had written traditional music before but never contemporary. She gave it a shot.

She premiered her first single and music video "Dirt Roads" in June 2024. The lyrics speak on and the video displays Indigenous pride.

"I carry my reserve and my people on my back," she said.

"When one of us wins, we all win," she said of Indigenous excellence.

In addition to sharing her story in the SCTC community room, she also performed some traditional songs; some in which were composed by her father.

The event was in collaboration with Central Michigan University's Office of Indigenous Affairs and College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences.

Wood also performed later that evening in CMU's Plachta Auditorium.

Additional SCTC events throughout Native American Heritage Month included a Nov. 14 Lunch & Learn, focusing on spiritual health with Traditional Healer Joe Syrette (Rankin Reserve Batchewana First Nation, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, Canada) at noon.

Syrette shared insights about traditional healing practices and their significance in the culture.

The Nov. 18 Lunch & Learn focused on "The Four Sacred Medicines – Chemistry/ Science Benefits."

STEAM students described how traditional knowledge is medicinal chemistry. The occasion also celebrated National Chemistry Day.

"No hard feelings though, just left the group. Went solo," he said. "I came to the East coast to do an album with Public Enemy called 'AmeriKKKa's Most Wanted'..."

Ice Cube and N.W.A. endured controversy for their explicit, political and controversial lyrics. The group was banned from many mainstream American radio stations.

Before performing "Rolling at Twilight," a song off of his new album," he said, "(It's) one of these grooves; I know you're going to like it."

For the first time in 14 years, Ice Cube has a solo album on Billboard's Top Rap Albums for his album "Man Down," which debuted at No. 8 on the Dec. 7 chart.

The audience cheered with excitement to the opening verses of their most successful song, the power ballad "The Flame." The song reached No.1 on Billboard's Hot 100 list.

Following this was another one of their hits, "I Want You to Want Me," which reached No. 7 on Billboard's Hot 100 list.

To close out the concert, Cheap Trick performed a threepiece encore of "Surrender,"

"Auf Wiedersehen" and "Goodnight."

Opening for Cheap Trick was American rock band Blue Öyster Cult.

The band formed in 1967 and has gone on to release 16 studio albums spanning five

The sacred gift of medicine personified in pure water is a trust responsibility of water operators everywhere.

Tribal Member Michael David recently received the

international 2024 Tribal Water Operator of the Year Award.

David has been employed in the certified position of water operator I for three years.

David received the award through the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, Inc. national tribal water systems programs on Sept. 13 in Phoenix.

"I think it's a great honor and I am happy that our tribe is being looked at as international leaders in water quality," David said. We are the only certified lab in Indian Country and in Michigan and this is a point of pride to our staff. It's very important for our Tribal Members to step up into these skilled and certified positions so we are protecting our tribal entities and our sovereignty as well.

"With us being Tribal Members that are operating the water plant, the work we do is extremely important to all our people who live here. These are our aunties and uncles, our grandmothers and grandfathers, our cousins, our nieces and nephews, everybody is involved. We are going to make sure this water is clean because we are passing this on to the next seven generations as well."

David said that, to his knowledge, SCIT is the first to receive this distinction in Michigan.

"This is the first instance that I have heard of a federally-recognized Michigan tribe winning this kind of recognition," David said. "I would like to thank the community and the Tribal leadership for their continued support of the work we do. We will continue as Tribal


